Greetings

I would like to share some of my thoughts with you. First, I would like to thank everyone who participated in the evaluation process of the Pastor (me). I wasn't sure what to expect, but neither was I surprised by the results.

I was hired a year ago as your Interim Pastor, this role is to lead, guide and advise you into your next "settled Pastor". The work involves looking into your past, your present and into the future, who do you want to be? It is about finding out who your neighbor is. Not just the person next door but beyond your own neighborhood or community. A lot of this involves really looking at yourselves, what do you see?

To the point of the evaluation that I would like to make is this, a great deal of the responses had to do with what we have called growing edges for me, what can I change either in me or in the way in which I deliver a particular portion of the worship service. I believe that I have taken a lot of what was written and am trying to incorporate it into my ministry. I would like to point out it is highly unusual for an Interim to be evaluated, but I did request this. I felt it was the only way for me to see what direction we should be headed.

So, to summarize the process, what areas are you willing to change? As with any relationship it is a two-way process. It must be a give and take, but one area that I feel is extremely important in this is conflict resolution. We will not be able to move forward if we do not learn how to agree to disagree and move on for the good of the entire congregation.

Finally, Summer is here! We want to thank the congregation for your willingness to go to "summer hours" for Sunday services at 9:00am and 10:00am as Coffee Hour, from June 25th to September 3rd. We will resume our normal 10am service after Labor Day, on September 10th.

In the month of July, Pastor Kerry will be taking some much-deserved time off on the 16th and 23rd. Deacon Kim Fischer will lead our service on the 16th and a guest pastor will be confirmed soon to join us on the 23rd. We are looking into installing railings on the front center of the sanctuary. This will help more people have safe access to the altar area.

The locks have all been changed in the church, vestry, dining room, and office area. The new keys have been registered and passed out to all committee members.


Security Lighting: We hope to install security lighting all around the buildings. We are writing an application for a grant to help offset the cost of this. We will keep you updated on this project.

As we wind down for the summer months, the Community Outreach Committee met on June 13 th and discussed ways in which we could encourage people to contact us about other outreach opportunities within the community like the American Cancer Association and the American Heart Association, who sponsor various events and fundraisers locally throughout the year. There is a possibility that Hooksett Congregational Church could become a part of these efforts and participate at some level. We talked about reaching out to the congregation via this newsletter, emails and announcements during worship service. If anyone does have something that they are passionate about, please let us know. Our next meeting will be August 8 at 6 pm.

Here are some highlights of happenings in June:

The food collection for June was Pancake Mix. July's food will be Rice/Pasta, and August will be Hamburger Helper. Donations go directly to the Hooksett Food Pantry and can be dropped off in the large yellow container located in the church vestry.

Socks for Sox headed up by John and Paula Vaughn was a tremendous success and the 242 pairs of socks were distributed to the New Horizons organization in Manchester, The Upper Room in Derry and The Kids Closet in Hooksett.

We collected \$576 in our Blanket Sunday fundraiser and this money goes towards blankets purchased and distributed by Church World Services for the needy locally and worldwide. This could be as many as 57 blankets for those in need.

Another box of donations (items they requested) was delivered by Mary Ellen Kresel to David's House in Lebanon, NH.

We are in the process of organizing a bake sale to support Ukraine, and more news about this fundraiser will be announced on upcoming Sundays in July.

July's "5 th Sunday" collection will be on 7/30, and the money collected from this effort stays within the church to help those within our own church community.

Again, we want to thank the congregation for being so generous in your giving. We are making an impact both locally, nationally and internationally.

Both text and tune were written for the Liberated Wailing Wall, the touring singing group of Jews for Jesus that was directed by the composer Stuart Dauermann. It was first performed in 1975 and is based on Isaiah 55:12. Did you ever wonder what the Bible means by trees clapping their hands? There are many interesting ideas about this because the Bible never really explains it. Is it God's special relationship with nature and it's ability to worship God? Is it a metaphor for human praise? Is it that the world itself celebrates when the exiles return? It's interesting reading. Google the song title while you are sitting by the pool or relaxing in the AC and there are lots of ideas about this fun but surprisingly deep hymn.


