Kerry's Corner:

Greetings, as I sit in my "corner" office I have the privilege of looking out at the garden. It's not like the garden that I got to know as a child growing up, my father insisted that the rows be straight, far enough apart to walk down and weed free!! This is not meant to be a criticism of the church garden; it has been a lesson for me. If you haven't had or taken the time to visit the garden, I suggest you do.

Some of you have reaped the benefits of Jeff's labor in the garden. I know last year if I needed a snack I would sneak out and grab a pickling cucumber. (don't tell him, I told him the chipmunks took them). For me the question becomes what good can come from such chaos? Well, the answer comes from Genesis 1:1 "In the beginning, God created the heavens and earth." Many do not pay attention to the next verse, "the earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep". The statement can seem to be odd or out of place, it looks like God intentionally begins his creation by making a dark, empty mess, and then in part 2 does the Word go to work with the famous "Let there be" lines.

This is incredibly significant and perhaps intentional. By starting with chaos and darkness, God teaches us two truths about how he works.

First, when God created everything, he did it by starting with a formless void and then shaping it with his Word, he did this to show that, in the same way, our lives are a formless void until God's Word comes in to bring life and peace, beauty and order.

The opposite is true as well, when God's Word departs from our lives, they descend back to chaos. In some of the plagues that Moses warned Pharaoh about, but he rejected the warning, and the plagues began. They followed a pattern of creation unraveling, for sin tears creation apart at the seams.



From The Music Committee:

We have new hymnals in our pews. The New Century Hymnal has been chosen for a number of reasons. The first is its organization and ease in finding hymns that correlate to the lectionary and special Sundays. But maybe more importantly, the development of this hymnal was done with the intention of making sure that the hymns have inclusive language so that every one of God's people can share in the praise and worship that comes from raising voices together. In the Introduction section of the hymnal is an interesting history of its development which we highly recommend if you are wondering how this hymnal came to be and why some of the language of our familiar hymns may be a bit different. As we grow into our new hymnal we may be challenged with some unfamiliar hymns which may become our new favorites. In order to help us learn the new music, occasionally, hymns may be repeated for several weeks so we can become familiar and really belt them out!! Let's open our hearts and our mouths wide and enjoy this new opportunity to praise God together.

The following passage is an excerpt from the foreword. The full text is found in the front of the Hymnal itself for anyone who would like to know more.

"God is always more than our human words are able to express. Our reverence for the mystery of God's being invites humility as we seek language that opens human hearts to the good news of God's love for all creation. We acknowledge the limitations of our words while we confess that in Jesus Christ the Word of God became flesh and lived within history. Where language fails us, we live with confidence that the Holy Spirit intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words. Our hymns are a testimony to this ministry of the Holy Spirit. Hymns are more than the sum of their parts. They become for us a language that transcends human speech. They are the poetry of eternity within time. They are signs of grace that comes from beyond ourselves. The New Century Hymnal does not claim to reach the heights of this vision of hymnody. It is, at best, the contribution of the United Church of Christ to the larger quest of the universal church to praise God faithfully in each generation. It is, however, a hymnal boldly committed to a spirit of inclusiveness. It welcomes and celebrates the diversity of all the people of God as surely as it confesses the mystery of diversity within God the Holy Trinity."
