

From The Community Outreach Committee:

Happy New Year from your Community Outreach Committee! We met on December 12th and discussed what we did in November and what we have been doing so far in December, and what we expect to complete in December. These have been two very busy months for the church.

We have completed our 5 for 5 goal, a standing given to churches who participate in 5 organized ways for giving to the wider community. We collected our last milestone in December called the Christmas Fund, and that was done on Christmas Eve, amount to be determined.

On December 31st we will collect once again for our '5 th Sunday' collection and this money stays within the church to help those in need within our own church community. Please reach out to Pastor Kerry if you are in need of assistance. This is completely confidential.

During November, we collected for Thanksgiving or 'Cornucopious Giving', and our total this year came to \$458.These donations became Walmart gift cards and were distributed by Pastor Kerry to those in need.

The 'Angel Tree' was put up in the Vestry for giving in December and these donations have been converted into Walmart cards and also distributed by Pastor Kerry. Our next effort will be the 'Mitten Drive', which we will be collecting for in January. More info to be announced.



We discussed some ideas for additional activities for the church to do for fun beyond the gingerbread decorating contest. These included: a talent show, candy bar bingo, church dance, flashlight easter egg hunt, legos night, and movie night.

The food collection for November was canned fruit, and December was small canned meats. Donations go directly to the Hooksett Food Pantry and can be dropped off in the large yellow container located in the church vestry.

Welcome 2024! How many of us heard or even sang "Auld Lang Syne" as the new year was ushered in? Most of us have lived through a good number of new year's eves. We've seen the ball drop time after time. What is the story behind that "Auld Lang Syne"? The meaning of the title translates to something like the good old times or times gone by. It is a Scottish song written as a poem way back in the 1700's originally attributed to the Scottish poet Robert Burns and then put to music. No one really knows who composed the original music but it has been arranged by many...even Beethoven. It didn't become popular in the United States as a New Year's song until Guy Lombardo and his band played the song each new year on radio and then television beginning in 1929 and continuing for 30 years. The poem actually has 5 verses and it is about remembering the good old days, but also about two people...friends... whose lives are brought together after an absence. It's about connections and kindness and reminiscence.

Verses 4 & 5

We two have paddled in the stream, From morning sun till dine; But seas between us broad have roared Since auld lang syne.

And there's a hand my trusty friend! And give me a hand o' thine! And we'll take a right good-will draught, For auld lang syne.

From the Prayer Team:

As we all are busy making resolutions for "being better" in the year to come, we can consider these few suggestions from the apostle Paul in the book of Galatians.

Galatians 5:22, 25-26 & 6: 1-5, 7-10 (The Message)

But what happens when we live God's way? He brings gifts into our lives, much the same way that fruit appears in an orchard—things like affection for others, exuberance about life, serenity. We develop a willingness to stick with things, a sense of compassion in the heart, and a conviction that a basic holiness permeates things and people. We find ourselves involved in loyal commitments, not needing to force our way in life, able to marshal and direct our energies wisely.

Since this is the kind of life we have chosen, the life of the Spirit, let us make sure that we do not just hold it as an idea in our heads or a sentiment in our hearts, but work out its implications in every detail of our lives. That means we will not compare ourselves with each other as if one of us were better and another worse. We have far more interesting things to do with our lives. Each of us is an original.

Live creatively, friends. If someone falls into sin, forgivingly restore him, saving your critical comments for yourself. You might be needing forgiveness before the day's out. Stoop down and reach out to those who are oppressed. Share their burdens, and so complete Christ's law. If you think you are too good for that, you are badly deceived. Make a careful exploration of who you are and the work you have been given, and then sink yourself into that. Don't be impressed with yourself. Don't compare yourself with others. Each of you must take responsibility for doing the creative best you can with your own life.

Don't be misled: No one makes a fool of God. What a person plants, he will harvest. The person who plants selfishness, ignoring the needs of others—ignoring God!—harvests a crop of weeds. All he'll have to show for his life is weeds! But the one who plants in response to God, letting God's Spirit do the growth work in him, harvests a crop of real life, eternal life.

So let's not allow ourselves to get fatigued doing good. At the right time we will harvest a good crop if we don't give up, or quit. Right now, therefore, every time we get the chance, let us work for the benefit of all, starting with the people closest to us in the community of faith.

God of creation and beginnings, as we move into a new year, help us by the guidance of your Holy Spirit to face the challenges, embrace the joys, and move through the struggles of 2024 as your children–confident in your love for us regardless of the circumstances. Create in us clean hearts and renew right spirits within us as we think about the year ahead and create our plans and make our resolutions. Holy spirit, we invite you into our lives. Help us to feel your presence as we care for and support each other. Help us to

recognize and nurture the fruits of the spirit in ourselves and recognize and encourage them in all those that we meet. In Jesus's name we pray, Amen.


